

JOHN E. MILLER

Lieutenant General, U.S. Army, Retired

John Miller is presently the President and founder of Miller Analytics, an independent consulting firm. He retired from L-3 Communications in August, 2007 where he served as President of the Linguist Operations and Technical Support Division.



Immediately after retiring from the US Army, John was employed by Oracle Corporation's Public Sector for over seven years in several roles. His last position with Oracle was as Vice President of Business Development and Program Management for the National Security sector which included all US Federal Intelligence Agencies, the Department of Homeland Security, the Department of Justice and the FBI.

Miller is the recent past Chair of the Board on Army Science and Technology, National Research Council, National Academies; recent past Chair of the Army Distaff Foundation; a past member of several Defense Senior Advisory Groups. He has participated in numerous special studies for the Army and the Defense Science Board. He currently serves as a Trustee for the US Army Command and Staff College Foundation.

LTG Miller spent most of his active military career commanding line units, developing new war fighting concepts and in teaching, training and leading soldiers and officers in a variety of assignments in field commands in Europe, the United States and the Republic of Vietnam, on the Army Staff, and in the US Army's Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC). He served as Deputy Commanding General (Futures), TRADOC, from July 1995-Aug 1997. Prior to that he served as the Commandant (President) of the US Army's Command and General Staff College. He also was responsible for the Army's Battle Command Battle Laboratory, the National Simulation Center and 11 other Army Schools that provide training and education for younger Commissioned Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers. General Miller had served at the Staff College in previous assignments as the Deputy Commandant (Dean), as a member of the graduate school faculty and as an author and instructor. During his tenure with TRADOC, he served for six years as the Army Proponent for Operations Research and Systems Analysis, military specialty "49". During his career he also served as Head of Delegation for Army to Army Staff Talks with Germany, Spain, and Italy.

Earlier key assignments include Commander of the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault) and Fort Campbell; Assistant Division Commander (Maneuver), 8th Infantry Division, Germany; Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff for Combat Developments, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command, Fort Monroe, Virginia; Commander, 1st Brigade, and Chief of Staff, 9th Infantry Division (Motorized), Fort Lewis, Washington where the Army's experimentation with the Motorized Division concept was done.

Lieutenant General Miller served two tours in Vietnam; the first as a Commander, Company B, 2d Battalion (Airborne), 327th Infantry, 1st Brigade, 101st Airborne Division and the second as the District Senior Advisor, Advisory Team 68, Delta Regional Assistance Command, Tam Binh District, Vinh Long Province, Republic of Viet Nam.

Lieutenant General John E. Miller holds a Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics from Southwest Missouri State University (now Missouri State University) and a Master of Science in Operational Research Analysis from Georgia Institute of Technology. He has completed executive development courses at Yale University, The Center for Creative Leadership and the Menninger Foundation.

Lieutenant General Miller's awards and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Silver Star, the Legion of Merit with two Oak Leaf Clusters, Soldiers Medal, Bronze Star Medal with "V" Device and two Oak Leaf Clusters, Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters, Air Medal with "V" Device and Numeral 2, Army Commendation Medal, and the Army Achievement Medal. Lieutenant General Miller has also earned the Combat Infantryman Badge, the Parachutist Badge, the Air Assault Badge, and the Army Staff Identification Badge.
