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Patrick J. Wesner, the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College Distinguished Chair for Development Studies, is a commissioned Foreign Service Officer with the USAID. Over his 12 year career with USAID, he has served overseas in Ethiopia, Mozambique, Malawi, Afghanistan, Bolivia, Guatemala, and Kosovo in addition to duty within the United States. Mr. Wesner previously worked for the U.S. Department of Labor as an International Relations Officer and as an educator teaching social studies. He is a graduate of the Advanced Strategic Leadership Studies Program at the School of Advanced Military Studies at Fort Leavenworth, earning a Master of Military Art and Science degree, and has conducted extensive research on China's growing engagement and influence in sub-Saharan Africa. Mr. Wesner also holds a master's degree in International Education from the School for International Training and a bachelor's degree in Sociology and History from Duquesne University.
