

In this seventh presentation for Academic Year 2018 of the Interagency Brown-Bag Lecture Series cohosted by the U.S. Army Command and General Staff School and the Simons Center for Interagency Cooperation, University of Kansas Professor of Law, Dr. Michael Hoeflich will lead a discussion on the ethics of cyber defense.



Dr. Michael H. Hoeflich is the John H. & John M. Kane Distinguished Professor of Law at the University of Kansas and director of the new master's degree program in Homeland Security Law & Policy at the University of Kansas. He is an expert on cyber law, policy and the integration of the private and public sector.

Dr. Hoeflich holds a juris doctor degree from Yale Law School and a Ph.D. from Cambridge University. He has taught at the University of Illinois, Syracuse University, and the University of Kansas and served as dean of the law schools at Syracuse and Kansas. Among his academic interests, ethics has played an important role for nearly four decades. Dr. Hoeflich has published numerous books and articles on the subject.
